
Outcomes-based reporting is when student learning is assessed and understood against an outcome, and communicated using an achievement indicator. Outcomes-based reporting provides clear descriptions of how well your child demonstrates the key skills, knowledge and attitudes identified in each course.

The outcomes describe what your child is expected to know and be able to do according to the <u>Alberta Education Program of Studies</u>. Alberta Education publishes resources for parents that further describe what your child is expected to know and be able to do in each grade: <u>My Child's Learning: A Parent's Resource</u>.

The report card is one way for teachers to communicate the progress and achievement your child is experiencing. We continue to connect through phone calls, meetings, email, our school website and with communications in our agendas. All of the various ways provide the opportunity for continued connections and ongoing feedback.

Although there are no formal SPTIs scheduled in December, if you wish to discuss your child's report card, please do not hesitate to contact your child's teacher directly to make an appointment.

Teaching Empathy

Empathy is the capacity to understand or feel what another is experiencing from that person's perspective. This is often called 'walking in someone else's shoes.' Empathy is an important quality of healthy relationships which in turn builds stronger families and communities. And, studies show that empathy can improve student achievement, increase emotional intelligence, and reduce bullying.*

Teach your child(ren) to be empathic towards others with the following:

Help them learn to understand facial expressions, body language, and social boundaries.

Teach them to listen to what is being said and to watch body language.

Ask them to imagine how the person feels in that situation.

Have them reflect on a time when they were in a similar situation. What was it like? How did they feel?

Teach your child to ask, when appropriate, about the person in difficulty.

Have them learn to show their care through words and actions.

By modeling empathic behaviour, and pointing out situations that call for empathy, parents can generate sympathetic responses in their kids. As your child is exposed to more empathic behaviour, they will develop these traits as well (Pizarro and Salovey 2002). The basic premise to guide empathic behaviour can be summarized by the Golden Rule: Do to others as you would have them to do you.

It is important that parents learn about competencies, and how parents can work together with their child's teachers/schools to support the development of competencies, both now and in the future.
